Word Reading

- respond speedily with the correct sound to graphemes (letters or groups of letters) for all 40+ phonemes, including, where applicable, alternative sounds for graphemes
- read accurately by blending sounds in unfamiliar words containing GPCs that have been taught
- read common exception words, noting unusual correspondences between spelling and sound and where these occur in the word
- read aloud accurately books that are consistent with their developing phonic knowledge and that do not require them to use other strategies to work out words

Reading Comprehension

- listening to and discussing a wide range of poems, stories and non-fiction at a level beyond that at which they can read independently
- becoming very familiar with key stories, fairy stories and traditional tales, retelling them and considering their particular characteristics
- discussing word meanings, linking new meanings to those already known
- checking that the text makes sense to them as they read and correcting inaccurate reading
- discussing the significance of the title and events
- predicting what might happen on the basis of what has been read so far



Writing Composition

Write sentences by:

- sequencing sentences to form short narratives
- re-reading what they have written to check that it makes sense

Writing Transcription

Spell:

- words containing each of the 40+ phonemes already taught
- common exception words
- segment spoken words into sounds and write the letters to those corresponding sounds

Name the letters of the alphabet:

naming the letters of the alphabet in order

Add prefixes and suffixes:

- using the spelling rule for adding –s or –es
- using the prefix un-; using -ing, -ed, -er and -est

Handwriting:

- holding a pencil comfortably and correctly begin to form lower-case letters in the correct direction, starting and finishing in the right place
- form capital letters

Vocabulary, Grammar & Punctuation

- leaving spaces between words
- Joining clauses using and
- Punctuate sentences using a capital letter and a full stop

Number & Place Value

- count to and across 100, forwards and backwards, beginning with 0 or 1, or from any given number
- count, read and write numbers to 100 in numerals; count in multiples of twos, fives and tens
- given a number, identify one more and one less
- identify and represent numbers using objects and pictorial representations including the number line, and use the language of: equal to, more than, less than (fewer), most, least

Addition & Subtraction

- represent and use number bonds and related subtraction facts within 20
- solve one-step problems that involve addition and subtraction (and the symbols +, -, =) using concrete objects and pictorial representations, and missing number problems

Multiplication & Division

 solve one-step problems involving multiplication and division, by calculating the answer using concrete objects, pictorial representations and arrays with the support of the teacher

Fractions

 find and name a half as one of two equal parts of an object, shape or quantity

Measurement

Compare, describe and solve practical problems for:

- lengths and heights (for example, long/short, longer/shorter, tall/short, double/half)
- mass/weight (for example, heavy/light, heavier than, lighter than)
- capacity and volume (for example, full/empty, more than, less than, half, half full, quarter)
- recognising and knowing the value of different denominations of coins and notes
- telling the time to the hour and half past the hour and draw the hands on a clock face to show these times

Properties of Shape

Recognise and name common 2-D and 3-D shapes, including:

- 2-D shapes (for example, rectangles (including squares), circles and triangles)
- 3-D shapes (or example, cuboids (including cubes), pyramids and spheres)
